Summary of Professional Experience

Prof. Dr. Guangjian Tu is currently a Full Professor of Law in the School of Law of University of Macau, a life member of Clare Hall (Cambridge University), an elected associate member of the International Academy of Comparative Law and a Standing Member of the Chinese Society of Private International Law. He is an editor for Chinese Journal of International Law and the global blog of www.conflictoflaws.net and regularly invited to review papers by international journals. He received his first degree of B.Sc. from the Science and Technology University of Central China (Wuhan, PRC), obtained a diploma on law from Zhejiang University (Hangzhou, PRC) and was qualified to be a lawyer and a judge respectively by sitting national examinations of the PRC. Having served in the Intermediate Court of Ningbo (Zhejiang Province, PRC) for a while, he left for UK to pursue his LLM and PhD in the University of Aberdeen. He formally started his academic career at the University of Macau in September 2007. Since then, he has been teaching and researching in the field of Private International Law, Comparative private laws. He has very good knowledge on American Private International Law and European Private International Law. He is especially well-known for Chinese inter-regional conflict of laws. He is the Convener for the Special Commission on the Study of Chinese Inter-regional Conflict of Laws. So far, he has published three monographs and many academic articles in widely-circulated and internationally-recognized journals. He has been invited to give a presentation or a public speech on many occasions at an international level or inter-regional level.

Experience in arbitration and mediation/ ADR

I have been teaching a master course titled “International Commercial Arbitration” in the University of Macau for years and teach the students topics for this field systematically and comprehensively, altogether 15 sessions not only for theories but also for practical cases. I have also been doing arbitration cases for years. In addition, I am very good at international litigation and mediation. I am especially good at the cross-section problems between arbitration and them.
